CAUSE Canada's history of building local capacity, committing to long-term relationships, and partnering with communities meant that in 2020-21, despite the COVID-19 pandemic-induced lockdowns globally, we continued carrying out our mission.

Our COVID-19 response focused on what we do best – mobilizing and supporting communities to meet their own needs and to protect and care for their community. Community-led responses enabled local capacity to care for some of the most vulnerable and marginalized populations and truly highlights the incredible power of community development approaches. For 37 years, CAUSE Canada has worked to empower communities to meet their basic needs and advocate for their rights. This year, we witnessed this approach reach new levels of effectiveness.

While much of 2020-21 focused on preventing and responding to the pandemic, our local teams and partners continued to also seek new ways of ensuring that people had access to basic health services, nutrition, and education. Some examples of this include, loaning out tablets to adolescent girls who were at risk of never going back to school to help them continue with their education, supporting kids to have access to school materials to work with while listening to radio educational programs, and ensuring access to maternal and adolescent health services.

On behalf of all our teams and the communities we partner with, thank you for your belief in supporting people living in extreme poverty to find dignity, justice, and the ability to meet their basic needs.

# Accountability

In 2020-21, CAUSE Canada provided close to \$1.8 million in support for 371,392 people in Central America and West Africa.

We provided information, programming, and assistance that helped people protect themselves and their communities from COVID-19 and meet their basic health and educational needs. This past year, we increased our focus on helping adolescent girls, who are often viewed as a burden to their families and likely to be the most impacted by the pandemic measures that have closed schools and increased early marriage and motherhood.

At CAUSE Canada, we are committed to using resources in the most effective way possible to help empower people who are living in extreme poverty and we are continually seeking to evaluate and learn from our work so that we understand how to be more effective. We aim to report transparently each year on our overall impact and financial standing.

In addition to annual financial audits, CAUSE Canada is an accredited member and annually submits an organizational audit to the Canadian Centre for Christian Charities.

We are continually striving to improve this accountability and are grateful to the CCCC for their leadership and support in helping organizations reach for the highest standards. You can expect accountability, transparency, excellence, respect, and responsiveness from CAUSE Canada.



## PARTNERING WITH THE GOVERNMENT OF CANADA FOR RELIEF AND DEVELOPMENT



We gratefully acknowledge our partnership with Government of Canada through Global Affairs Canada.

In 2020-21, the Government of Canada provided over \$700,000 in matched funding to CAUSE Canada and our partners and offices overseas to help support the health and well-being of communities in Guatemala, Honduras and Sierra Leone. This partnership supported:

- 19,835 women and adolescent girls to receive access to maternal, sexual and reproductive health support and services
- 40,029 young children, pregnant and lactating mothers, and other vulnerable populations to receive nutritional support
- 198 Community-Led Coronavirus Action teams to be established and trained to identify cases, isolate the sick, trace contacts, transport patients at risk to the hospitals and implement safe burial practices.


# Our Mission

Inspired by faith in Christ, CAUSE Canada strives to be a catalyst for global justice. We provide sustainable, integrated community development in rural West Africa and Central America through authentic, collaborative, long-term relationships.

At CAUSE Canada, we have the goal of helping the most marginalized and vulnerable populations eradicate extreme poverty. At the heart of our work is the belief that we are all equal and no lives are worth more than others, no matter where you live.

The inherent value of all lives means that we must integrate gender equality into all our work as women and girls' lives are too often considered to have much less value than men and boys resulting in less access to financial resources, education and health services, and ultimately keeping them and their families trapped in extreme poverty.

Through community partnership and development, we are focused on improving access to quality education, and better health outcomes, knowing that with these tools, the most marginalized and vulnerable people can take steps to leave extreme poverty.



### PROBLEMS WE AIM TO SOLVE

Without the belief that you can better your life, you cannot better your life.

At CAUSE Canada, we aim to fight extreme poverty, but we also want to create long-term solutions.

Continually we see an impact on poverty when we focus on empowerment instead of aid. When we help girls to go to school, they stand up in a group and say, "I could never have gone to school without the support of CAUSE Canada but now I can support my family, keep them healthy and help others in my community."

Our goal is to help people who are overlooked – the most impoverished, marginalized, and disempowered, to gain the skills and resources to have dignity. We focus on gender equality as girls and women often have very little input in their own lives and we provide all children, with an emphasis on girls, opportunities to go to school.

Because girls and women are strongly associated with the success of the family, and particularly their ability to have and raise children, we are focused on health and well-being. If girls are forced to marry too young, not only do they miss out on their education but they also have a high likelihood of dying in childbirth.

# Programmatic Pillars

### Our primary objective is to eradicate extreme poverty.

To do this, we eliminate barriers that keep people in extreme poverty. Each year, we help people gain access to basic health care services, quality education, and acquire skills to support their livelihoods.



## Our values of faith, justice, and dignity are critical foundations and drivers of our work.

Because of our faith in Christ, we strive to work with people who are marginalized and vulnerable to help them realize opportunities for leaving extreme poverty and its impacts.



#### We aim to empower local people.

This means providing individuals and communities with training, tools, and resources that enable people to act when issues arise. This helps empower communities to meet the needs of their children, women, and families long after CAUSE Canada's programming has ended.



## We work in partnership with rural communities.

People living in rural communities often have the least access to health care, education and other resources. We are currently working in some of the most rural, impoverished areas in West Africa and Central America where there are no other systems of support.



## We believe there is more than enough for everyone.

Poverty is a direct result of inequality – it is not that there isn't enough but that some people have very little. Gender inequality is particularly harmful resulting in half the population being unable to participate and benefit equally, and this also contributes to cycles of poverty. There is enough for everyone, we just need to continue to strive to learn how to better share it.



### Everyone must participate if we are going to end extreme poverty.

The most marginalized people living in extreme poverty must have an opportunity to participate and contribute. Canadians too, must take a stand against extreme poverty and get involved through praying for people in need and working to solve poverty, by giving and sharing resources, by volunteering and becoming engaged in the issues.

## Where We Work

CAUSE Canada partners with hard-to-reach rural communities in Central America and West Africa to empower people living in extreme poverty to meet their basic health, education and livelihood needs.

We believe that all people, no matter where they live in the world, deserve dignity and justice.



#### Guatemala

CAUSE Canada first started its work in the Western Highland municipalities of Guatemala working with the Indigenous Mayan Mam people. Guatemala's Indigenous people comprise 44% of the population however 79% of this population live in poverty and 40% live in extreme poverty. Guatemala is considered one of the most unequal places in Latin America and the poverty among Indigenous populations is coupled with high discrimination and exclusion.

#### Honduras

Like Guatemala, Honduras is a country of high inequality with rural communities largely excluded from education and health access. Honduras also has the second highest rates of poverty in Latin America and the Caribbean. While the populations served by CAUSE Canada in Central America are very different, the ability to share resources, knowledge, and support between these two countries near to each other mean increased efficiencies and effectiveness in meeting critical needs.

#### Sierra Leone

CAUSE Canada has a long history of working in West Africa. Sierra Leone, as one of the poorest countries in the world, presents many difficulties to the work however, it also has so many opportunities to make a significant difference in the lives of people living in extreme poverty. Our knowledge of and commitment to the country has helped radically increase the number of children attending school in the Northern District

### **RESPONDING TO COVID-19**

In April 2020 as our new fiscal year began, we continued to adapt and respond to the problems caused by the COVID-19 pandemic which was only just beginning. We moved approved funding to support the most urgent needs and reached out to you, our partners and donors, for support for response-specific funds.

Our teams mobilized, using our learnings from the Ebola crisis response in Sierra Leone, to develop prevention and response strategies, manage public education campaigns, oversee the installation of handwashing stations, and coordinate the distribution of cleaning and disinfecting supplies and essential goods.

Throughout the pandemic, we have continued to work with communities in Sierra Leone, Guatemala, and Honduras. In total, 332 communities including 215,836 people, received information and education and 102,804 people directly benefited from CAUSE Canada's COVID-19 prevention and response projects in West Africa and Central America.







# How Hon Helped



#### **Community-Led Response**

Our teams worked with rural communities to develop COVID-19 prevention and response protocols. Trainings were held to provide information about COVID-19 and build 198 Community-Led Coronavirus Action teams to quickly identify cases, isolate the sick, trace their contacts, transport patients at risk to the hospitals and implement safe burial practices.



#### **Public Education Campaigns**

Public education campaigns were organized to improve the public's understanding of COVID-19 transmission, symptoms and prevention strategies and refute misinformation and myths commonly surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic.



#### Handwashing Stations and Other Resources

To help prevent the spread of COVID-19, 881 handwashing stations were established, and 14,935 face masks were distributed to leaders with limited access to proper protection from the virus. Personal Protective Equipment and other critical supplies were also supplied to 133 municipal hospitals and community health centres.



#### **Critical Food Supplies**

Prior to the pandemic, many communities and families were already struggling with chronic malnutrition. The restricted mobility in all countries together with the increased unemployment has caused widespread food insecurity and increasing levels of severe acute malnutrition. Over the past year, we met the nutritional needs of over 40,120 individuals at high risk of malnutrition.



#### Stopping SGBV and Meeting Psychological and Social Needs

Mental health and psychosocial support are critical during crisis when women and girls are at high risk of sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV). Community health volunteers were trained to monitor cases of SGBV and child abuse and provided with information to help make referrals for emergency resources. Community girls' and women's clubs were formed to build resilience, coping skills, and solidarity. Over 35,500 girls and women participated in these clubs.



#### **Prioritizing Education**

After the Ebola outbreak in Sierra Leone, many children, especially girls, never returned to school. Knowing that a gap in schooling could mean an end to formal education, we have been working with children and adolescents to help them retain a connection to education. In Sierra Leone, we worked with 530 children and adolescent girls to ensure they could participate in radio education and access offline educational resources, including tablets, to continue studying while schools were closed. We are continuing support to children in Guatemala and Honduras despite continued school closures.

# The Sustainable Development Goals

The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) were adopted by the United Nations in 2015 as a universal call to action to end poverty, hunger, and discrimination and to protect the planet. The SDGs outline 17 categories with specific calls to action to be achieved by 2030.

The Sustainable Development Goals aim to balance social, economic, and environmental sustainability around the world. The creativity, intelligence, technology, and financial resources from all societies internationally, are necessary to achieve these goals. As an organization, CAUSE Canada primarily focuses on SDG 1, 3, 4 and 5.



**SDG 1: No Poverty** 

No one deserves to live in extreme poverty. For those of us living in Canada, it is difficult to imagine what this means. In practice, it may mean only buying food for one meal today because you do not have enough for tomorrow. Or, it may mean giving birth to your child alone because you do not have enough to pay for transportation to a doctor or midwife, even if the medical care is free. It may mean sending your child to school with a crowded classroom and a teacher with almost no education.

There are many resources available globally, but some people don't have access to any of it. At CAUSE Canada, we believe that everyone deserves dignity and the right to live without the burden of daily struggles to meet basic needs including nutrition, education, or health. SDG 1 aims to eradicate extreme poverty for all people everywhere.



## SDG 3: Good Health and Well-being

Many of the most pressing health issues in the world are easily preventable or remedied but because of poverty, people die. At CAUSE Canada, we believe that, while poverty is often the culprit for poor health you cannot begin to rise above poverty when you are fighting for your life. SDG 3 aims to ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages.



### **SDG 4: Quality Education**

Education provides the foundation for future opportunities. In many places in the world, kids are not in school and when they are, they are not meeting the education standards for reading and mathematics. The impact of poor schooling results in children dropping out after primary school with little or no literacy or numeracy skills. This is particularly devastating for girls because the end of school means the end of childhood as they become brides and mothers. SDG 4 aims to ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promotes lifelong learning opportunities for all.



### **GOAL 5: Gender Equality**

Gender equality is not only a fundamental human right but a necessary foundation for a prosperous world. There has been significant progress over the last few decades with more girls attending school and the number of early marriages decreasing. Still, too many women and girls are considered property with no access to resources or the ability to make decisions about their own lives. This inequality amounts to half the population not being allowed to participate in solving some of the most pressing issues that keep them in poverty and without dignity. SDG 5 aims to achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls.

# Good Health + Well-being

IMPACT STORY SDG 3

At 18 years of age, Rosa\* already had 3 children and almost everyone in her small community in Honduras was experiencing extreme poverty. Since there were no opportunities for Rosa to continue going to school once she completed primary school, she married an older man in the community to help relieve her parents' burden.

By the time she met the CAUSE Canada local team in Honduras, Rosa was tired and scared.

Organized crime driven by powerful gangs and the transnational drug trade, has made Honduras one of the most violent countries in the world and violence permeates most communities and households.

Like many places, women are generally considered to have much less worth than men and this violently plays out in the extreme rates of feminicide. For Rosa, it meant that her husband regularly hit her and told her she was no good, and as her son reached his pre-teens, he was already telling her that he was going to kill her if she did not do what he wanted. At 18 years of age, her husband owned her body, and neither of them could afford to care for the children they already had.

When CAUSE Canada's local Honduran team began working with adolescent mothers, Women's Health Committees, and community leadership, Rosa learned that she had rights and that there were people around her that wanted to help stop the violence, help her be a healthy mom, and find opportunities to help herself and her family have a better future. Community leaders and the local Women's Health Committee learned how to deescalate family conflict and to help her and her family move beyond violence and fear into safety.

Today, Rosa has hope for herself, her family and their future.

In 2016, CAUSE Canada began implementing programming to stop the high rates of women and children dying during pregnancy, delivery and in the first year of life. Between 2016 and 2020, the program provided direct health services to 18,333 women and 72,964 children. Many of the pregnant and new mothers served through the program were less than 18 years old with many under 15 years of age.

As a result, in 2019, CAUSE Canada began implementing PODER, an adolescent health program aimed at reducing adolescent pregnancy, keeping girls in school, and providing support to many adolescent mothers who experience increased vulnerability to family violence and maternal mortality.

Reduced maternal and infant mortality starts with healthy families in healthy, safe and respectful relationships.











Goal 3: Ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages

#### 2030 Targets

- Reduce the global maternal mortality ratio to less than 70 per 100,000 live births.
- Ensure universal access to sexual and reproductive health-care services, including for family planning, information and education, and the integration of reproductive health into national strategies and programmes.
- End the epidemics of AIDS, tuberculosis, malaria and neglected tropical diseases and combat hepatitis, water-borne diseases and other communicable diseases

#### CAUSE Canada's Impact in 2020-21

- 173,118 people received education and information on sexual reproductive health and rights.
- 765 adolescent girls and women accessed maternal health services.
- 19,411 adolescent girls and women accessed sexual and reproductive health services.
- 215,836 people were reached with public education campaigns to increase understanding of COVID-19 transmission, symptoms and prevention and invalidate misinformation and myths surrounding the virus.
- **332** communities were supported to prevent and respond to the COVID-19 pandemic.

# Quality Education

**IMPACT STORY** 

SDG 4



In April 2020, CAUSE Canada downloaded offline educational resources onto the tablets that were previously being used for Mobile Learning Labs in rural communities and loaned these to each of our bursary students; signing a memorandum with parents and the students that they would use the tablets to

Over the last year, as bursary girls started to return to school, our team began to hear reports on the success of this strategy. One story particularly stirred our hearts:

"My name is Kanko\* and I am attending the University of Makeni and I am in my second year of study.

Thank you is so simple but so powerful, grateful is one word that expresses my love and gratitude to the bursary program. I am very much grateful to CAUSE Canada for all the support they have given to me, from the beginning of my academic studies until now. Words can't express how happy and thankful I am.

This organization made me to be called a university student, if not I wouldn't have been in university by now because my parents could never afford the fees, rent and food but this program is providing all of these for me. I now attend classes without any fear of being asked for tuition.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, all schools were closed and students were no longer going to school or attending classes. The bursary program deemed it good to support us with learning materials that would keep us busy. They gave us tablets loaded with learning materials, tutorials, a dictionary, and more research sites to take home and read with.

There were modules that I loved so much in class and some that I find very difficult to study and comprehend. But with the tutorials, I can now proudly say that all modules are very easy to understand for me. My professors are very proud of me in terms of presentation and class participation.

If not for this program, I would have dropped out school a long time ago. This program has made it possible for me not to drop out of school. I pray that the good Lord guide and protect you from the COVID-19 pandemic and keep you safe for us."

Goal 4: Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all

#### 2030 Targets

- Ensure that all girls and boys complete free, equitable and quality primary and secondary education leading to relevant and effective learning outcomes.
- Ensure that all girls and boys have access to quality early childhood development, care and pre-primary education so that they are ready for primary
- Ensure equal access for all women and men to affordable and quality technical, vocational and tertiary education, including university.
- Eliminate gender disparities in education and ensure equal access to all levels of education and vocational training for the vulnerable, including persons with disabilities, indigenous peoples and children in vulnerable situations.

#### CAUSE Canada's Impact in 2020-21

- 27,625 children and adolescents participated in primary and secondary school.
- 640 children participated in quality early childhood development programming.
- 229 women and men with disabilities participated in business management and vocational training.
- Because more girls are out of school than boys, CAUSE Canada focused its work on helping to reduce the barriers girls face when going to school. This resulted in reaching and supporting 17,145 girls and 8,578 boys to access school.

# Gender Equality

IMPACT STORY SDG 5

This year, in partnership with the Fund for Innovation and Transformation, CAUSE Canada began testing an innovative approach to eradicating child marriage by educating men seeking child brides and families with young girls about the negative consequences of child marriage for them, their families and entire communities. The focus of this innovative project was to address the demand for child brides, relieving the potential brides from the burden of having to fight to stop a marriage.

Fatuma\* (15) grew up with 5 siblings in Kurubola, a large town with a health centre, police post and more than one school. In this region, most families rely on farming and trading, but many still struggle to meet their most basic needs.

A couple of years ago, Fatuma's father was bitten by a poisonous snake, leading to the severe damage of one of his legs. With her father unable to work, Fatuma's mother became the breadwinner of the family and because of her struggles, Fatuma and her siblings were forced to drop out of school.

Since the accident, the 65-year-old town chief had been helping Fatuma's family – providing food, money and clothing for the family. In March 2021, the chief visited the family and requested to marry Fatuma. Fatuma's parents quickly accepted this request, thinking of the help they would receive, and the hope of caring for their daughter.

Several days after a wedding date was set, Fatuma's mother was invited to a 2-day training with CAUSE Canada on the importance of girls' education and the health consequences of early marriage. After the training, Fatuma's mother rushed home to her husband, sharing all she had learned. As a result, Fatuma's marriage to the chief was cancelled and Fatuma returned to school to continue her education with support from CAUSE Canada.





Goal 5: Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls



#### 2030 Targets

- End all forms of discrimination against all women and girls everywhere.
- Eliminate all forms of violence against all women and girls in the public and private spheres.
- Eliminate all harmful practices, such as child, early and forced marriage and female genital mutilation.
- Ensure women's full and effective participation and equal opportunities for leadership at all levels of decision-making in political, economic and public life.



#### CAUSE Canada's Impact in 2020-21

- All of CAUSE Canada's work emphasizes equality and the importance of justice and inclusion of everyone, particularly women and girls.
- 35,509 people received information on stopping sexual and gender-based violence, including where to get help.
- 4,617 people received support, services, and referrals to protect and support themselves in stopping sexual and gender-based violence.
- In 20 small communities, 113 child marriages have been cancelled and over 6,000 people have committed to not participating in these arrangements.
- 3,806 women and adolescent girls directly benefited from support to prevent and respond to sexual and gender-based violence and/or early marriage during the COVID-19 crisis.
- 5,220 women completed trainings to support them in participating in leadership in their communities.

### **Commentary On Financial Results**

#### Revenue

Donations in 2020-21 reached \$402,841. These gifts come from individuals, congregations, and companies.

\$739,078 was received from Global Affairs Canada, a decrease from previous years due to the completion of the Maternal, Newborn and Child Health (MNCH) and beginning of an adolescent health program. CAUSE Canada also received funding from the Canada Fund for Local Initiatives (CFLI) to provide COVID-19 emergency

CAUSE Canada received new funds from the Fund for Innovation and Transformation in 2020 to support the elimination of child marriage.

Due to the impact of the pandemic in Canada, the organization was eligible for the Canada Emergency Business Account loan which it expects to repay by December 2022.

#### **Expenses**


\$1.8 million was spent on international program activities.


In March 2020, the MNCH program was scheduled to end but was extended until September 2020.

Administration costs fell significantly as CAUSE Canada reduced its team in Canada to help strengthen the organization during an uncertain financial period.

The organization began implementing new fundraising strategies which caused an increase in the funding allocated to these activities.

Administration includes costs such as administrative staff, office rent, and governance.
